Delivering GRASS in Stoke Bruerne

We are very fortunate that somebody has stepped in to take on this task, and we are thankful for that.

<u>Defibrillator</u>

Stoke Bruerne Canal Partnership would like to remind villagers of the position of the public access defibrillator (PAD) on the left hand wall of the Canal Museum. In the unfortunate event of it being needed, access is by dialling 999 or 112 (works on a mobile phone anywhere in the world) quoting your location, and the operator will give you the access code. You don't need to be trained to use a defibrillator – anyone can use it. There are clear instructions on how to attach the defibrillator pads. It then assesses the heart rhythm and will only instruct you to deliver a shock if it's needed. You cannot deliver a shock accidentally; the defibrillator will only allow you to shock if it is needed.

Having said that, if there is enough interest, Canal Museum staff are happy to arrange a refresher course for those who would like one. Please let Louise or Steph know on 01604 862229 if you'd like to attend.

Lastly, we would like to thank Trevor Allum, a Friends of The Canal Museum volunteer, who has kindly agreed to undertake regular checks of the defibrillator to make sure its batteries are topped up and the unit is operational.

Alderton Art Festival 2019

Despite a sometimes cold, blustery and showery weekend, we had another fantastic festival. Thanks to cash donations, as well as donations of cakes and 2 barrels of real ale, from 3 local companies at Pury Hill Business Park, our total refreshment profits were a record at £2,159. The white elephant stall (aka Alderton Antiques) and book stall generated an astonishing £887 from people's throwaways. Income from the sales of paintings came in at a very respectable £1,672, and was our 3rd highest painting income over the last 15 years. Thanks to some magnificent prize donations (and one towards costs) from companies at the Business Park (plus some slick selling techniques from Kesh), our grand prize draw turned in another record of £920. Total income from stalls and advertisers etc brought the gross profit to £5,922 which, despite the weather, was only 2% down on last year.

However this year, the committee decided beforehand to invest £2,300 into the future of the festival with much needed new marquees, foldable chairs, tables, and a new barbecue. We are grateful to South Northamptonshire Council for a £700 capital grant towards these costs. So we finally made £4,322 for the upkeep and development of St Margaret's Church. Not bad for a tiny village of 100 souls of which 40% turn out to help. Thank you villagers and others for your dedicated help. Thank you also to our growing number of local sponsors, namely Brand Ambassadors, Hagerty International, KRW Accountants, Michael Graham, Neill Taylor at Pury Hill Business Park, South Northants Council, Towcester Mill Brewery, Whittlebury Hall, Village Framers and last, but by no means least, Zija International. GENERAL NEWS

Notes from a Local Farmer

Well, readers, the time keeps marching on. Harvest is over with largely good weather and even better now we are finished. Harvest was, on the whole, very good (no famine this year) and prices have receded partly due to Brexit, as has the price of lamb.

We have had very little rain in September and while I am writing this on 18 September, it is drier now than the rest of the year, with grass disappearing fast. We have drilled 80 acres of stubble turnips after spring barley, which, strangely enough, looks very well. These will be grazed by the breeding sheep through the winter. The rams are ready to put with the sheep this next week; we are putting one ram with fifty ewes, with a blue marker on the ram, to show they had the chance to become pregnant. Two weeks later we change the block to red. They all look very well flashed this year compared to last year.

Cultivations for winter crops are well advanced but we will wait for rain before we drill.

We have sold a lot of straw again this year, to go to Wales for livestock feeding as there is very little arable cropping in Wales.

We have just spread 500 tons of recycled plasterboard on our heaviest fields; hopefully this will mix in with the soil to make it more workable in the future. So there is plenty going on. Talk to you again soon.


