Unto Us A Child Is Born

Being a grandfather is a privilege; spending time with my two little girls always brings a smile, even when they are fighting dragons and I am a horse in their eyes. When I take the eldest swimming, spending the whole time following her around getting cold is pleasure. Like many grandfathers before me, I am always excited to have them around, while at the same time I have concerns about the world into which my grandchildren have been born. With the birth of a new child, our family systems expanded within moments, never to be the same again. But then, as it is said, the birth of any child changes the world.

Writing this letter, then, for the Advent magazine, my mind is drawn to the birth of a small child that took place over 2,000 years ago and changed the course of humanity; a birth that continues to take place each year in the hearts of Christians around the world. I can still remember waiting for news to come of the birth of my grandchildren, checking to make sure I had not missed a text or phone call; I found that my mind was flooded with thoughts and expectations. I ponder what would have been going through the mind of that young girl, Mary, as she travelled to Bethlehem. Did she have any understanding of how her life was going to change and the many sacrifices she would have to make? Did she have a conversation with Joseph while they travelled the dusty road to Bethlehem, considering what the future had in store for them as parents?

Like every parent or grandparent, we cannot help wondering what the child will look like, whose facial characteristics will he or she have. Pelagius, a British monk/theologian (354-420), said that to look at the face of a new-born child is to see the face of God; what a gift this is! I have had the privilege on many occasions to look upon the face of a new-born child to see the face of God. Of course, when Mary and Joseph looked upon the face of their son, Jesus, they really were looking at the face of God.

It is written in sacred Scripture that God is with us and will never forsake any who call upon Him. I find reassurance here: that even when the world seems to be set on self-destruction and saturated in political turmoil, our Heavenly Father is still at work in making this a better world. If the birth of a small child into our families is powerful enough to change the dynamics of how we and our families function, how much more impact the birth of Jesus, Son of God, 2,000 years ago has had on the world. Then imagine the effect of allowing Christ to be born within our hearts this coming year. As we await the birth of the Christ-child once more into our very selves, we prepare for our lives to be transformed.

As I travel around the Benefice over the Christmas season, I shall come across a variety of nativity cribs. Some Christians put the Christ-child in before the 25th while others wait until Christmas Day itself (the time most appropriate to the narrative). Whichever your custom, can I ask that you spend a short while in front of the Christ-child this Christmastide to ponder the difference that this event, the birth of Christ, makes in your life. A small child is very vulnerable and we give a great deal of ourselves to look after and nurture them. This is the same with our faith: at times it can be very fragile and in need of feeding and care. We do this not only by reading sacred Scripture, and in prayer, but also through regular attendance at the Eucharist when we renew our communion with the One who was born into the world to bring God's saving grace.

I look forward to seeing you all over the Christmas celebrations. May I wish you and your families all a happy Christmas and prosperous New Year. Canon Richard Stainer

Canal Partnership

During the autumn, our Adoption Group has continued to work to keep the canal centre looking tidy and cared for. Autumn gales have brought down several old ivy clad trees and these have been dealt with to keep paths clear and safe. The museum car park has been cleared of leaves and debris and the soakaway drains kept clean. The flower beds and tubs have been weeded and replanted so hopefully they will look good again in the spring. An area of old allotments down by the lower locks was cleared of a huge amount of overgrowth on an exceedingly wet day in October by a stalwart gang of volunteers. We are now discussing the best use for this area next year – wild flower grassland and an area of herbs for boaters' use are under consideration.

We have been quite successful in sourcing funding to enable the far end of the Woodland Walk to be improved during the coming winter months and hope to get this project underway as soon as possible.

In October, the Partnership organised another 'Big Draw' event on the Museum green, on a bright and dry day albeit with a very chilly wind! Some 40 or more adults and children, encouraged and advised by a professional artist, enjoyed the free opportunity to be creative during the half term holiday. We are grateful to Stoke Bruerne Boat Company, the Northampton branch of the Inland Waterways Association, South Northants Council and CRT for enabling this event to take place.

The Canal Partnership has been included in discussions and input into the ongoing plans which the Canal & River Trust are making to improve the visitor experience for those who come to Stoke Bruerne. Details of these plans are now under consideration and it is believed that CRT aim

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to start work on improvements to the Museum cafe and ground floor in the early spring. We are pleased that Stoke Bruerne is at the forefront of the East Midlands priorities for expenditure. Stoke Bruerne Canal Partnership takes this opportunity to wish all residents and visitors good Christmas cheer and a healthy and successful New Year.

William Brown read the lesson from Isaiah and extracts from Karl Jenkins' Mass for Peace (The Armed Man) brought many to the point of tears. From the church the procession moved to the village green, led by Malcolm and Connor Lear, who carried the cross as the symbol of the Prince of Peace. Steve Howell read the names of The Fallen, Rebecca Ludlow played the Last Post before the National Silence. Wreaths were laid by Gary Marshall (British) Army, Nic Tomic (United States Air Force), Gary Day (British Army) and Steve Howell (Royal Navy), the uniformed organisations and Charlie Baker and Georgie Smith on behalf of the school. Refreshments were served in the village hall courtesy of the churches. It was a most moving occasion which brought many in the village together. It is estimated that some 350 attended. SHUTLANGER

Shutlanger Parish Counci

We met on Thursday 19 November in the village hall and were delighted to be joined by one member of the public. It does make such a difference to our work when people from the village are able to join us at our meeting. As quite a lot

has been going on this year, this meeting was to some extent finishing off projects we already had in hand. One major project is the real equipment of the village playing field, and we agreed to take out a loan to complete the financing for this. As a parish council, we are able to access borrowing at very competitive rates and this helps make projects like this affordable. We hope that the new equipment for the playing field will be in place during the late winter, so that villagers can start enjoying it from next spring onwards. As we are sure people walking around the village will have noticed, the new dog poo bins are now all in place. We hope that people walking the dogs will use his bins, making the village a nicer place for everybody. Continuing on that theme, we will be planting some shrubs on the grass triangles at the junctions of the High Street and Twitch Hill with the Showsley Road. There is only a limited range of shrubs that we can plant with the approval of Northamptonshire Highways, and we are going to opt for viburnum bushes. These should flower nicely in the spring and brighten these two junctions. We also hope to get a lot of this year's leaf fall removed from pavements and walkways over the next couple of weeks. There has been a great deal of rain this autumn, and for the first time in many years due to our parish clerk's patient work with Northamptonshire Highways, most of the drains on the village roads have been cleared. Please let us know if any of those drains are now starting to block up again.

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One area where we have limited legal powers to intervene is the maintenance of the village hall. While the Parish Council can donate a limited sum of money towards the upkeep of this historic building, the upkeep does need more help from the village more widely. We would welcome your ideas for raising funds to renovate the village hall, perhaps involving a summer fete or some other such event. Please let the parish clerk know if you are able to help, or have any ideas as to what we could do. Finally, we would like to continue with the village speed watch campaign to reduce the continuing problem of speeding along the roads in the village. This campaign however is going to need more support from other people living in the village, many of whom live on or close to our roads and are directly affected by cars driving too fast through the village. Due to lack of support, we were only able to ask the police to issue a very small number of letters to drivers exceeding the speed limit during our campaign in late summer this year. By comparison, the speed watch campaign in Stoke Bruerne led to well over 150 letters being issued. Again please let our parish clerk know if you are interested in joining a speed watch campaign during the spring or summer this year.

Used Postage Stamps

Notes from a Local Farmer

Dear Readers

Well, what a change in the weather; the last time I spoke to you, I commented on how dry it was; since then it has never stopped raining.

We have managed to drill 250 acres of winter barley and wheat but the windows have been so small that we still have a further 50 acres to drill, plus 100 acres of winter beans. This may have to go into spring crops if the weather does not dry up.

We have taken the rams away from the ewes to avoid late lambers, although they all appear to have been 'done'!

Maize harvesting was completed on a fine day in late October, and yielded well. We have also loaded large quantities of wheat and barley onto lorries; sometimes the lorries stay here overnight as the drivers only seem to go home at the weekends.

We are down to 90 lambs left from this year's crop and should see them all go to market this month. Our next job will be with the sheep, to have their tails trimmed out, ready for lambing. This is being done by contractors, and helps to keep them clean going into the spring. We will be scanning them in early December to see how many lambs each sheep is having.

We have been busy with estate maintenance, butting the lower branches of the young trees off. I counted 128 trees in the avenue to Lord Hesketh's house as was. We also found time to install a new cattle grid going on to the road, as the old one was too narrow for modern equipment.

Sounds as if I deserve a holiday! Talk to you soon.


