Rector's Letter

My dear friends,

We are living in a very rapidly changing world; the landscape of our society is changing daily. In this time of instability, the one certain and unchanging rock is the love of Christ. We can clearly see glimpses of this in the acts of kindness that everyone is offering to their families, neighbours and communities. In these dark times, we gather around the light and love of Christ.

At this present time, the ever-changing situation surrounding the COVID-19 pandemic (also known as the coronavirus) has had and will continue to have an impact on our daily lives, including aspects of our sacramental lives. For the foreseeable future our church buildings will be closed. Just because the buildings are closed this does not mean the Church is closed; each one of us, even if we feel isolated in our own homes, are the church the body of Christ in our communities. The world is in need of our prayers more than ever. Pete Heffron (our Ordinand) and I are working closely to make sure we can still offer pastoral care across the benefice. If you need any practical support, or spiritual guidance, please contact one of us. Please do not send normal emails to this address.

Even though we are not meeting together, we can still walk with Our Lord and His disciples on their (and our) journey. There will be many opportunities to watch church services and be part of their worship on the television. There are also some prayer apps you can use, like Time to Pray and Pray as You Go. I know that for most of us, this is not what we truly want nor how we expected to celebrate the main Christian festival of the liturgical year. However, this would be a good opportunity to spend more time in prayer and contemplating Holy Scripture. We could start on Palm Sunday by reflecting on the gospel of Mark, chapter 14 through to chapter 15 verse 47. Reading it slowly during the week, take time to place yourself in the story. On Easter Sunday, move to John chapter 20, verse 1 to 18, which is a good passage to reflect upon.

As Christians, we are people of hope and we know that our Lord Jesus Christ is with each of us at this time. We all live in small communities; our discipleship calls us to look out for our neighbour. Over the last six months, I have been taken aback by the love and generosity that lies at the heart of all our communities and how we look out for each other on a daily basis. If you know of people who are alone and self-isolating and you can't visit them, a good way to keep in touch is by telephone. Regular calls can go a long way in letting people know that others are there for them.

It was a well-filled Holy Cross Church for the funeral of Edith Sharp on 9 March. Aged 96, Edith was one of the oldest residents born in the village; she was much loved and respected. Scouts

1st Collingtree & Milton Malsor Scout Group is celebrating its half century. Scouting in our parishes has been enriching the lives of our young people for 50 years - not just tying knots but having all sorts of adventures and experiences - camping, cooking on open fires, sailing, archery, international trips and being at the heart of the local community to name just a few. To mark this momentous 50 year milestone, in October this year, 1st Collingtree & Milton Malsor Scout Group is organising a special camp for 70 of our young people to Brownsea Island, where Lord Baden-Powell laid the foundations for the worldwide Scouting movement.

Starting out with just a handful of children in 1970, the group now boasts more than 70 Beaver, Cub, Scout and Explorer members, ranging in age from six to 18-years, with many more on the waiting list. Where else can young people gain skills for life, such as confidence building, leadership and citizenship, while also enjoying activities like scuba diving, sailing, rock climbing – and, of course, camp fire food? It's a testament to the hard work of all the leaders and volunteers over the years that this pack has continued to thrive.

Cub Scout leader Tim says "Success for me is sending the Cubs home at the end of a Cub camp dirty, smelling of the camp fire with a huge smile on their faces." The only limit to the fun we can have in Scouting is the need for leaders; so any adults out there that have a little time on your hands and want to make a difference, come and give Scouting a try.

To celebrate 50 years the group is also running an overnight camp for ex-Scouts, so if you used to be a Scout or a leader with the group, please do contact us.

During its 50-year history, the pack has also seen girls join its ranks. Long-term member, Hannah Fraser, who has been in Scouting since the age of eight, has now become a leader and also gained a Queen's Scout Award – the highest award in Scouting. She is our Beaver leader.

The group has been working hard to raise funds to make the adventure to Brownsea Island possible. As well as raising money for the trip, the group is also hoping to secure funds for minibus travel and essential scouting equipment, as well as the creation of a commemorative neckerchief for the birthday event. Owing to the coronavirus outbreak, the trip and ex-Scouts camp will be delayed until 2021 but that will still be within our 50th year!

Notes from a Local Farmer

Hi everyone,

As I write this on 16 March, the whole world seems to be in turmoil, but out round the farm, nothing has changed.

Although we continue to have wet and changeable weather, it has been mild throughout. The grass has continued to grow, particularly on my lawn, which has had its second mowing this year.

We have grazed our breeding flock on stubble turnips all winter, which has saved the pastures and rested them. Now the lambs are going out on grass which is two inches long, and nice and fresh. Lambing has gone well with only 35 left to lamb. The kind weather at turn out has helped lamb survival rates.

On the arable side, we are at a standstill because of the rain. We have a lot of cultivating to do with spring wheat and barley to be drilled. As long as it is drilled by mid-April, we should be OK. I am comforted by the fact that with long hours and big equipment, it is within our capacity to get things done quickly.

Coming back to the current situation, it is interesting to watch the dash for food at the supermarkets, and the emptying shelves. It was suggested two weeks ago by some official that farming in this country is questionable, as places like Singapore import all their food. It must be remembered that lack of food would bring a government down, resulting in riots on the streets. In this country, we have one of the best supply chains in the world and despite overwhelming demand, shelves are being refilled.

Perhaps farming will be more appreciated.
