Rector's Letter

I have just returned from two wonderful weeks in Cornwall, where Monique and I walked a few of the coastal paths. The weather was glorious; the sea and sky were a mixture of rich blues, adding to a beautiful green landscape. We passed ancient ruins once home to our ancestors; we walked through villages with row after row of holiday cottages that once belonged to people who made up a living community. When the holiday season ends, the streets become a ghost town - so different to when I visited as a young boy with my parents when these villages were home to families who had lived there for generations before the communities were pushed out. We also saw redundant churches falling into disrepair because the Christian community had ceased to be.

On 20 July in Alderton, we celebrated our patron saint, 'Saint Margaret of Antioch'. The theme that we chose this year was 'community'. A few people from the village shared stories of their experiences in their community; they were excellent and moving. I am sure you will agree with me that our communities are essential.

Community life is at the heart of the Christian teachings because we must show hospitality by welcoming others into our lives and looking out for each other. The Christian community is spread throughout the world. Wherever I travel, I find Christian hospitality, whether with Benedictine nuns in the mountains of Pennsylvania while visiting family or Methodist or Anglican families running bed and breakfasts; when I walked the Pennine Way, they shared their faith and went out of their way to make sure I was comfortable.

On my return from my holiday, it was a pleasure to be back within the communities in the benefice. As Christians, we work hard at making sure we keep a presence within the villages, and our churches open for all who wish to step inside for any reason, to worship, attend a wedding, baptism, funerals, art festivals etc. Because once we lose the buildings, they are gone for good and will become like the ancient sites that I am sure we have walked past in our lifetime. Wherever we go, we are part of a global Christian community.

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VILLAGE NEWS



SHUTLANGER

Parish Council

The Parish Council met on Thursday 14 July in the village hall, which is looking ever more splendid inside thanks to the efforts of the Village Hall Committee. Our Ward Councillor Louisa Fowler, gave a helpful update, noting that the planning application for the gigantic DHL development near the Bell Plantation was being

knocked back and forth but hasn't gone away. The new road from the junction of Cowpastures Lane and the A5 will be complete in January 2024; we can all see the sporadic construction work going on down there.

West Northants Council (WNC) remains determined to hand over many of its responsibilities it currently undertakes to parish councils and a first harbinger of this is that Shutlanger Parish Council is being asked to take over maintenance all of the roadside verges in the parish. While there are opportunities for us to get mowing done more often and to a better standard, residents will have to pay for the work through the Parish Council precept in future (currently WNC pays as part of its precept). We are getting quotes on how much this mowing will cost. More such handovers will follow.

We looked again at whether Shutlanger should put together a village development plan. Such a plan would have some weight in planning decisions in the parish. If, for example, a developer wanted to build 500 houses in one of the fields adjoining the village, then the village's views expressed in a village development plan could help deter such development. However, preparing the plan involves a lot of work over several months and comes at a financial cost to the Parish Council. If several people in the village are interested in putting in their share of this work, please let the clerk know as otherwise it isn't going to happen.

We are looking to improve access round the parish. We have already replaced the cast iron bollards at the end of the footpath on Twitch Hill so that people with restricted mobility can get through onto Main Road. Next, we will put in a wider gate into the playing field and longer term will seek to replace the few stiles on footpaths in the parish with kissing gates, also suitable for people with restricted mobility.

Our next meeting is on Thursday 8 September at 7.30 p m.

Alderton History Talks

On two consecutive Saturdays in late July in St Margaret's Church, we gave history talks with cake and tea to two local history groups. The first was to Potterspury local history group who had heard of us through Keith Harry at Grafton. They wanted to know about the Queen's Oak project run by Geoff Lucas, Linda Dards and myself in the 1990s.

This was a project to trace and grow a young oak to replace the old tree that had been fatally damaged by fire, and also to research its history and retell the story of the famous meeting between king Edward IV and Elizabeth Woodville, the first commoner Queen of England, mother to the two ill-fated little Princes in the Tower and of Elizabeth of York, mother to Henry V111 and grandmother to Queen Elizabeth I. This project resulted in 5 trees planted on the eve of the Millennium to carry the story through into a new age and also a play written by Paul Drewitt and acted by local children. This was repeated three times, once at Alderton at Christmas, once at Stoke Bruerne on St Valentine's Eve and once at Grafton on 1 May, the King and Queen's wedding anniversary.

The talk went very well and the group was enthusiastic and keen to help in the future. All of this was helped hugely by the copious amounts of cake and tea consumed by everyone, both when they arrived in church after a talk by Charles Reece and after the talk about the Oak. Charles gave his talk on and about the Mount, its history and the archaeology carried out by 'Time Team' during the first half of the 21st century that revealed some of the amazing story of the Alderton ring work. The event was supposed to end with a walk over to the Queen's Oak from Alderton but by then the temperatures had begun to rise and we decided it was too hot to expose anyone to a fairly long walk across open fields.

The second history talk was to the Roade local history group. They wanted to know about Sir William de Combemartin, our Knight. Once again, the offer was for a talk with tea and cake and once again the afternoon went incredibly well. The group was lively and interested in Sir William's story and the recent conservation work carried out by Elizabeth Cheadle for Hugh Harrison Conservation. They wanted to know about the rare wooden effigy, who he was and how he came to live in Alderton.

This story is earlier than that of the Queen's Oak and happened during the reign of Edward I (Queen Eleanor's Edward). Our Knight was a wool merchant and one of the richest men in England. He supplied wool to the Netherlands for the weaving of cloth and the beautiful early medieval tapestries; he was an Alderman of London and a Member of Parliament under Edward. He also supplied a great deal of money to Edward for his castle and empire building. Once again, the afternoon was a big success. The group was very interested and lively and the cake went down unbelievably well - so much so that we were in the grand position of having nothing but dirty plates to take home with us!

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Both events were warm in atmosphere, lively and happy. The people who came to both were incredibly generous and although we had asked for a small basic charge, they insisted on paying extra which raised approximately £360 across both events and took our Knight fund very close to the £11,000 mark and a big step nearer our goal to pay for his new tomb chest. Two very successful afternoons in Alderton's beautiful little church.

Art Festival



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
