Rector's Letter

August was a beautiful month this year, with her long warm days. One Thursday afternoon, I was kindly invited to join the WI on their outing on the canal in Stoke Bruerne. Mike took us to the tunnel and back on his narrowboat; it was a pleasant trip that we all enjoyed, and I would recommend it to everyone. Sadly, on this occasion we didn't see any dolphins, but maybe next time. Once we were sitting in the mouth of the tunnel and darkness was all around us; the only light to be seen was the light at the end of the tunnel. This brought home to me that when we feel that we are in the dark and that nothing is going our way, if we keep our eyes fixed on the light of the world (Jesus) and keep moving forward then there is nothing we cannot overcome with Him by our side.

Once back on dry land, I walked along the towpath spending time with the boaters who had moored up for the night. I came across one person whose name escapes me, but not the time we spent chatting. He was over from Canada on holiday with his family, on a hire boat for a week. He described how for many years he was head Pastor of a large church, but now he helped lead other churches into growth. It never fails to amaze me when I meet other Christians from around the world involved in the same work that we are called to, that our loving God is at work globally trying to bring healing and meaning to everyone in the world. He was amazed that I covered six places of worship; he is not the only Christian minister that I have spoken to from the other side of the Atlantic about the different styles of ministry. I always explain that we have many dedicated disciples within our churches that keep the ministry of Our Lord active and alive in each village. I couldn't do my work without them. Our church buildings remind us of the presences of our loving God living in our communities. When we feel that there is darkness around us and times are difficult for one reason or other; we must remember that we are not alone, the Church can help you to move into the light at the end of the tunnel.

Grafton Regis: 1,000 Years in 100 Minutes

The last Grafton historical walk of 2022 will take place on Saturday 24 September; hopefully the sun will shine on our twenty or so costumed characters from our village's history and on our visitors on the day! Why not plan to spend a leisurely afternoon strolling round our beautiful and historic village? You'll learn about Grafton's colourful past from some of its famous and infamous characters and finish up with tea and cakes!

We have a pretty good record for choosing sunny days, although 18 June was an exception - but the show went on regardless, and some of the outdoor encounters happened in the church instead. In the picture, Cardinal Wolsey, Elizabeth I, Anne Boleyn and Katherine Parr are waiting their turn to replay their parts in Grafton's history.

We start at 2.30 p m in the village hall, where you meet characters from the early history of the village, all in authentic costume - the Abbot of Grestain, members of the Woodville family, and Richard III. Henry VIII and Elizabeth I are just two of the eminent figures encountered en route to the church of St Mary the Virgin.

In the church, Lady Crane, the last tenant of Grafton House, tells the tragic story of the destruction of the house during the Civil War, and there's an account of the history of the mysterious Grafton portrait of Shakespeare. There's also an opportunity to see the impressive new heritage centre which has been created with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund. Then, back to the hall to meet a couple of more recent residents and for refreshments.

The cost, including tea and cakes, is £9.50 per head, under 16s £1.00, under 5s free, with all profits being shared between the funds for maintenance of the village hall and of the church.

St. Mary HLF Tower Repair Project

Friday 2 September should see this project finally come to its conclusion; by then we will have fulfilled all the requirements of the project and hopefully I will be able to commit all my files to the filing cabinet at the church, and have some space at home.

This was phase one of the church refurbishment programme; we will now start on phase two, which is the relocation and refurbishment of the two medieval tombs relocated to the very damp west wall in 1899 by our Victorian ancestors.

It has been a long-drawn-out process not only to put the project plan together, get DAC approval, work through the Covid pandemic but to raise the funds to carry out the work. As churches are classified as religious buildings, there are very few agencies that fund church projects and because their funds are restricted the grants given are small. When you have a project with a costing of £130k, it takes a lot of grants of £4.5k to meet your target. Now we are in the age where many of the buildings are not only of historical importance but also operating as community centres etc, there needs to be a major rethink by the funding agencies in how church buildings are classified.

St. Mary's is open every day and our latest addition is a model of the Siege of Grafton Manor by Cromwellian troops. We have tried to put together a display that reflects its setting, a country church; we have many positive comments from our visitors so we hope that we have achieved this. My thanks to all the members of the PCC and villagers for the work they put in in bringing this project to its conclusion.



Notes from a Local Farmer

As of 18 August, we have finished harvest with only the spring beans to do when they are ripe. It was a very early harvest due to hot weather and drought; yields were good surprisingly although beans may suffer. With a shower of rain on the 15th we have drilled 110 acres of stubble turnips for the breeding sheep this winter. No corn has needed drying this year which is a plus for us, saving a lot of time and fuel so now we reflect on plans for cropping next year.

On the sheep enterprise, we have been selling fat lambs but the price has been lower due to the hot weather, school holidays and lack of demand from France. It will soon be time to go to the sheep sales to replenish stock for the autumn. I am hoping we may have some grass growth by then. We are feeding the lambs at the moment as there is very little grass and we need to get them fat for market; they tend to take the grass away from your breeding sheep if you have to many about.

So there is plenty going on even if you don't see us in the Feldman. Talk to you all again next month. Robert Davy
