#### **Rector's Letter**

In September we enjoyed the art festival in Saint Margaret's Alderton, and in October the art trail in Saint John's Blisworth. Both churches were a ray of colourful artwork, the creation of many talented artists. I always marvel at gifted people who can turn a blank canvas into a beautiful picture or sculpture; an image they can see before the first brush stroke. They were all individual pieces of work showing how different each artist is in their approach. Our creator started with a blank canvas when He created the universe, and each one of us as individuals.

I visited the two church schools within the benefice as they reopened after the summer break, to welcome everyone back to school and to meet and welcome those that had just began their educational journey. It reminded me of my first few weeks in primary school many years ago. I made an ash tray in pottery class, painting it bright colours of blues and reds. Even though this was not an exceptionally nice or attractive piece of artwork, my parents loved it. I can remember when I was given the clay, I knew exactly what I was going to make.

Looking at the new children I wonder what kind of people they will grow up to be, what will be their purpose in life, and what did our Heavenly Father have in store for them. This brings to mind Jeremiah 18. Jeremiah is in a potter's house, watching the craftsman at work. God speaks to Jeremiah and says, 'Like clay in the hand of the potter, so are you in my hand.'

In the first book of the bible, it says "So God created mankind in His own image," if God is a creator and we are made in His image, we too are called to use our creative side, our imagination to create something of beauty. Each of us have that gift within us.

Our Heavenly Father sees inside each one of us, the beautiful gifted human being He has created. We need to bring out that person, allow His love and grace to flow over us, to look freshly at the teachings of Jesus, the apostles, and the Church. To some this sounds too difficult, but God is your creator and He's created each one of us for a purpose, and it is down to us to find that purpose for what we were created for and bring it to fruition.

An artist does not produce their work to keep for themselves or to make themselves wealthy, as we know most artists are not usually well off. They use their gifts to share with others, to bring joy and comfort into other lives. In the same way that Our Heavenly Father gives continually to us not for His own end but that we can be free and whole as the person we are called to be. When we use our gifts for others, the reward is far greater than if we had kept them to ourselves.

Each person has a creative side, and we should allow it blossom. During both art events, I was asked about my creative side. Even though I achieved an A in 'O' level art, producing a piece of work to hang on the wall or put on a pedestal is not one of my gifts, believe me. But what I do enjoy doing, with my creative mind, is to tell and write stories; at first, I wrote for my children and myself, but in the last few years, I have had two novels now published.

'Like clay in the hand of the Potter, so are you in my hand.'

God said to Jeremiah, what is God creating you to be, and what gift do you have to enhance others' lives.

#### Friends of The Canal Museum Update

The Trustees of the charity would like to thank volunteers Trevor Allum, Rob Westlake and Kathryn Dodington for their help with the removal of the shipping container from the Canal Museum car park to Stoke Bruerne Cricket Club.

The container, which has been a familiar sight in the car park for many years, was used to store all the infrastructure for the annual Village at War and Family Festival events which, following suspension due to Covid and lack of new volunteers coming forward, are no longer able to continue. Instead, the Friends will now be supporting smaller events organised by the Canal Museum itself. We are pleased to say that almost all of the contents have been donated free to local good causes such as the Scouts, Cricket Club and other 40s re-enactment

societies. The shipping container, also given free of charge, is now enjoying a new lease

of life serving Stoke Bruerne Cricket Club where it will be storing their equipment. We thank Pat and Ian Stimson for all their help in making it happen and we are delighted to know that the container is already proving to be a useful asset.

Some of you will have noticed that the museum boat, NB Sculptor, has been absent from the canalside in Stoke Bruerne for almost a year. The boat has been away at a boatyard on the River Weaver and then at the National Waterways Museum at Ellesmere Port for much needed repairs to the back cabin, and a re-paint. We are pleased to announce that thanks to an army of volunteers who have brought her back from 'oop north in relays, a shiny resplendent Sculptor is back on her mooring outside the Museum.

#### An Armenian Experience



November 2022

Earlier in the summer I spent a week in Armenia visiting Anahit, a student I have sponsored. During my visit, I attended the baptism/confirmation of her family and was honoured to be her Godmother. Armenia was the first country to adopt Christianity as the state religion and so Christian traditions go back a long way. Despite the long period of repression under Russian rule until 1991, the Armenian church is thriving with 97% of the population claiming to be Christians. Baptism and church attendance were discouraged during the Soviet era, hence the reason why Anahit, her two sisters and parents had not been baptised.

The baptism ceremony was in many ways similar to ours but also different in many ways. A key role for the Godparent was to wash and dry the face of the person being baptised. Fortunately, only the Godfather had to make any promises on behalf of those being baptised; I would have struggled as I do not speak Armenian!

Having received the sign of the cross, those being baptised had not to wash for 2 days. Quite a request in a hot country.

After the two days, there was another ceremony with more ritual washing and drying by the Godparents followed by a family party. In the evening the bath and shower were well used.

While I was there, I saw several very old churches dating back to the 6th century AD. They were well preserved, unlike the church in Anahit's village which had been destroyed during the soviet era. We

walked up the hill to a small chapel to light candles.

Armenia is a beautiful, mountainous country and the people are very friendly. Much is different from our own country; for example, breakfast is the main meal of the day and if one goes swimming (as I did), a standard British bathing costume is considered to be very skimpy!!!


#### Larder
