Rector's Letter

Rejoice in hope. Romans 12:12

Tree Dressing, 21 December 2022

Our tree dressing took place at the top of Church Lane under our tree, which was given to us by Neill Taylor to replace the cherry tree which was blown down by 'Storm 'Doris' some years ago. Our young tree is flourishing in spite of close encounters with the digger when the church drains were put in at the beginning of the year, and an incredibly dry summer. The tree is still quite small so we are grateful to Doris Knights for the loan of an inventive Graham and Brian who build us a frame to go around the tree each year so that we can hang all the bird food, lights and on the evening of the 21st, the 'leaves' that we write with our messages for the coming year.

This year the weather was mild after a period of very unpromising bitter cold, ice and snow. We were grateful for the good weather, and mince pies, cake and mulled wine were consumed as usual under the tree while we gathered, wrote our messages and sung the two carols that we usually sing at this little festival. The solstice this year happened on 21 December at 9.47 p m so we were a little ahead of ourselves. Our vicar, Richard Stainer, told us about the importance of the winter solstice to human beings for thousands of years and told us about the amazing 'New Grange' in Ireland that is over 5,000 years old, predating Stonehenge. Here a stone 'mound' with fascinating drawings both outside and in holds a narrow passageway leading to a small chamber that has a single small opening to the sky. At the winter solstice only,



the rising sun sends a shaft of light through the aperture and the light moves round the chamber illuminating only certain of the drawings in the stone. No one knows the real meaning of the drawings; they would probably have been interpreted by the priests of the time. Richard went on to tell us of how early Christians, realizing how important the festival was to our ancestors, adopted it and it gradually became the Christmas time that we celebrate today. He spoke very movingly about the 'light' awakening within each of us at this time and the hope that it offers.

GENERAL NEWS How to Contact the Police

Burglary Prevention Advice

Our aim is to prevent Northamptonshire residents falling prey to criminals. We are taking a more scientific approach to repeat victimisation. Due to the location of recent burglaries, we know that your home is at heightened risk of being burgled. An opportunistic type of criminal is enticed into a situation as a result of an insecurity or easy opportunity. If we simply remove that temptation and make it difficult, then it is estimated that a staggering 90% of crime would be prevented. We have compiled a short home security checklist to help guide you through your security arrangements. Working through this checklist will help you ascertain whether you have any security weaknesses. Please remember to call 101 if you see any suspicious activity or 999 if you see a crime in progress. Alternatively, if you have any information about crime or criminals in your area, you can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111. Outside the property:

- Make thieves feel exposed when they approach the front of your property by using low hedges or low fencing. Keep any gates shut when you're out.
- Use garden lighting to deter trespassers. If the property is well overlooked, choose lights which come on automatically at dusk and stay on all night until dawn. Low wattage bulbs can cost less than 1p per night in electricity.
- You can reinforce your boundary by using prickly plants. Use of natural plants is exempt from the Occupiers' Liability Act 1984 because it is natural.
- Don't leave tools and ladders lying around for burglars to use. Remember to keep the shed as secure as possible. Thieves often search for tools nearby to break into properties.
- Where possible, keep bins chained up away from the main house and out of sight. Criminals often use them as climbing aids or ways to transport stolen property.
- Thieves often look for subtle changes in the environment. Open gates, empty driveway, letters left in the mailbox are all invitations to a criminal. *Inside the property:*
- Keep all doors and windows locked even if you are in the house. If you leave a room, close and lock the doors and windows.
- If you have an alarm, use it! Most alarm systems can be 'zoned', which means parts of the house can be active at night time.
- Always remove the keys from locks to stop someone breaking a small pane of glass and entering using the key. Keep keys out of sight and in a safe place.
- Leave lights on in multiple rooms. Automatic timers can switch on lights and radios. Remember that in the winter it can get dark in the early afternoon.
- Make items traceable. Mark your property with your postcode using a UV pen or consider specialist liquid forensic coded solutions. Following the above measures will make you a less attractive target for thieves. People who are security conscious are less likely to be burgled than those who are not.
