Rector's Letter

Lent

It always excites me as the days begin to lengthen, and snowdrops and other bulbs break through the darkness of the soil - a clear sign of the resurrection occurring again in nature. At the beginning of February in the Celtic cycle of the year, the festival of Imbolc, a time to think about the resurrection and rebirth of the sun, is celebrated. This festival comes halfway between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. On 2 February, in the church's calendar, we celebrate the Presentation of Jesus in the temple, also known as Candlemas, 40 days after Jesus's birth; this festival ends the Christmas season. Both are celebrations of light, physically and internally, calling us to grow in our awareness of ourselves and our relationship with God.

We have many daily opportunities to look after and care for our physical well-being, but what about our inner spiritual lives? Have you ever wondered what the Christian faith is about but never had the opportunity to ask questions but would like to know more? This Lent, we are running a course called Christianity Explored in a relaxed and informal way, for anyone enquiring about the Christian faith without being asked to commit. We will be finding out more about the person at the heart of the Gospels by following Mark's account of the life and ministry of Jesus. This is also a good opportunity for anyone who wishes to look again and deepen their relationship with Jesus. Lent is a time of inner transformation for us all, a time to let new life grow within each of us to fulfil potential.

The course starts on Wednesday 1 March at 7.00 p m and then each Wednesday after, finishing on 12 April in Holy Cross Church Milton Malsor. 
Grafton Regis: 1,000 Years in 100 Minutes

Police Information

Burglary Prevention Advice

Our aim is to prevent Northamptonshire residents falling prey to criminals. We are taking a more scientific approach to repeat victimisation. Due to the location of recent burglaries, we know that your home is at heightened risk of being burgled. An opportunistic type of criminal is enticed into a situation as a result of an insecurity or easy opportunity. If we simply remove that temptation and make it difficult, then it is estimated that a staggering 90% of crime would be prevented. We have compiled a short home security checklist to help guide you through your security arrangements. Working through this checklist will help you ascertain whether you have any security weaknesses. Please remember to call 101 if you see any suspicious activity or 999 if you see a crime in progress. Alternatively, if you have any information about crime or criminals in your area, you can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Outside the property:

- Make thieves feel exposed when they approach the front of your property by using low hedges or low fencing. Keep any gates shut when you're out.
- Use garden lighting to deter trespassers. If the property is well overlooked, choose lights which come on automatically at dusk and stay on all night until dawn. Low wattage bulbs can cost less than 1p per night in electricity.
- You can reinforce your boundary by using prickly plants. Use of natural plants is exempt from the Occupiers' Liability Act 1984 because it is natural.
- Don't leave tools and ladders lying around for burglars to use. Remember to keep the shed as secure as possible. Thieves often search for tools nearby to break into properties.
- Where possible, keep bins chained up away from the main house and out of sight. Criminals often use them as climbing aids or ways to transport stolen property.
- Thieves often look for subtle changes in the environment. Open gates, empty driveway, letters left in the mailbox are all invitations to a criminal. *Inside the property:*
- Keep all doors and windows locked even if you are in the house. If you leave a room, close and lock the doors and windows.
- If you have an alarm, use it! Most alarm systems can be 'zoned', which means parts of the house can be active at night time.
- Always remove the keys from locks to stop someone breaking a small pane of glass and entering using the key. Keep keys out of sight and in a safe place.
- Leave lights on in multiple rooms. Automatic timers can switch on lights and radios. Remember that in the winter it can get dark in the early afternoon.
- Make items traceable. Mark your property with your postcode using a UV pen or consider specialist liquid forensic coded solutions. Following

the above measures will make you a less attractive target for thieves. People who are security conscious are less likely to be burgled than those who are not.

Royal Mail Scam Alert

On 13 January I received a text message which appeared to come from the Royal Mail. It read: "James attempted to deliver your parcel today but no one was home. You can reshedule your parcel for a new deliver date, via; https://uk-redirection.com" Note the misspelling of "reschedule" and the web site given; it was a spoof which looked like a genuine Royal Mail site, but now no longer works. The site asked for a £1.42 redelivery fee to be paid by credit card, which sadly, I did, as I was expecting a parcel, and the site looked genuine so I paid in good faith.

A few days later the fraud department of my bank rang to inform me of a scam relating to the Royal Mail, where the villains obtain credit card details by asking for a small amount of money, and the bank asked me if I had any knowledge of two transactions amounting to $\pounds 1,000$ which they had blocked. As I had not authorised the payments, I expressed my thanks for their diligence.

We live in nasty times, when it is easy to be duped. I hope this piece may stop you from falling into the same trap that I did. I was so lucky that the bank was on the ball and alerted me to the scam.
