Rector's Letter

I'd like to remind you all that on 1 March, we start our Lent course, Christianity Explored, at Holy Cross Milton Malsor at 7.00 p m. It's still not too late to join in; please drop me a line and come along and discover what Mark has to tell us about Jesus.

Lent is a sacred time in the Christian calendar where we set aside 40 days to examine our lives, focus, on what needs to change to improve it, and deepen our spiritual relationship with the divine. For some, this is done by giving up something they enjoy or taking on a commitment. It is a time of being with Jesus fasting in the desert; you might spend more time in prayer, spiritual reading, and joining the Lent course. Over the 40 days, there is always a temptation to give in, maybe thinking it's not worth the hassle. If we can resist breaking our Lenten observance and keep to what we have set out before us, this will make us stronger to resist bigger temptations in the future. During Lent, we reflect on the events that led up to the death of Jesus on the cross. It's a time to prepare ourselves to celebrate Easter.

A few years ago, I set out to walk a 360-mile trek across the heart of England. I spent months planning what essentials I needed to carry in my rucksack. It was full of the necessities that I would need for that journey. A week into my walk, I was met by Monique for the weekend. During the next couple of days, I went through my rucksack once again, this time with a fine-tooth comb. I soon realised that a fifth of what I had was unnecessary, so I gave it to Monique to take home. This made my backpack much lighter, and I could move more freely. We do this in life; as we travel through each day, we collect what we believe is a necessity. This could be material things, or habits that are not healthy for us, maybe too much time in front of the TV or electronic devices, alcohol, or preconceived ideas, where we have become stuck in a certain way of thinking, we are no longer open to new ideas, etc. Like my rucksack, what we collect through our everyday lives can begin to weigh us down and hold us back from full filling our full potential in life. It's a time to let go and be with Christ.

Over the next five weeks, as we gently move towards Easter, it would be a good time to do our own personal internal spring clean. To search closer within our hearts and be honest, what needs to change within me to have a healthier physical, mental and spiritual life. Every moment of our lives is a precious gift from the divine. Let us not waste it by being weighed down. Easter is about the resurrection, a new way of being a different person. Let us all celebrate Lent in the right manner so that when we arrive on Easter day, we can be a new person with Christ.

Professor David Glyn Vaughan OBE - 23.10.62 to 9.02.23 RIP



My amazing husband finally succumbed to his cancer on Thursday 9 February. David was a worldrenowned glaciologist and worked for the British Antarctic Survey for nearly 40 years. He came to Alderton when we bought The Nook in 2003; we married in 2005. He spent most of this time living in Cambridge during the week, returning home to Alderton on a Friday night and going back to Cambridge on Monday morning; his Alderton time was very important to him.

When lockdown happened, David found himself in the village full time, which was one of the very few plusses about covid. David was diagnosed with stomach cancer in August of 2020. David used his time to really get involved in the village and became quite an expert on marquee erection.

Over the years, the villagers got used to seeing David running, cycling, riding Ziggy or walking Havoc round the village; I think he gave some of our younger neighbours a run for their money on the cycling

David had many friends in the village and was always keen to scythe the wild flower meadow in the

village field; he also helped Margaret Hall Townley create proposals for funding for the knight. Leatherwork was a new hobby for David, which he went about with his usual energy; we were lucky enough have a leather workshop in the garden where he created some lovely objects like handbags, bowls, boxes, and doorstops. One of the last objects he made was a brandy barrel for Bernie, the St Bernard. (see photo)

Many of the villagers attended J Fest in July 22; this was a party with a festival theme to celebrate both his and my 60th birthdays, and also a celebration of life in general. David did most of the organisation and it was the most wonderful party that actually went on for several days; people attended from far and wide and it was lovely that his friends can remember him from that.

David was a truly inspirational man who helped some of the village young people make decisions on their future science pathways; he was always happy to talk to anyone who was interested in what he did.

The last few weeks were really hard but David had worked with his cancer and the medical teams to get the most of the time he had left. I know everyone who knew him is so sad it wasn't longer. David, you will be sorely missed R.I.P. Jacqui Vaughan

Police Information

Burglary Prevention Advice

Outside the property:

Our aim is to prevent Northamptonshire residents falling prey to criminals. We are taking a more scientific approach to repeat victimisation. Due to the location of recent burglaries, we know that your home is at heightened risk of being burgled. An opportunistic type of criminal is enticed into a situation as a result of an insecurity or easy opportunity. If we simply remove that temptation and make it difficult, then it is estimated that a staggering 90% of crime would be prevented. We have compiled a short home security checklist to help guide you through your security arrangements. Working through this checklist will help you ascertain whether you have any security weaknesses. Please remember to call 101 if you see any suspicious activity or 999 if you see a crime in progress. Alternatively, if you have any information about crime or criminals in your area, you can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

- Make thieves feel exposed when they approach the front of your property by using low hedges or low fencing. Keep any gates shut when you're out.
- Use garden lighting to deter trespassers. If the property is well overlooked, choose lights which come on automatically at dusk and stay on all night until dawn. Low wattage bulbs can cost less than 1p per night in electricity.
- You can reinforce your boundary by using prickly plants. Use of natural plants is exempt from the Occupiers' Liability Act 1984 because it is natural.
- Don't leave tools and ladders lying around for burglars to use. Remember to keep the shed as secure as possible. Thieves often search for tools nearby to break into properties.
- Where possible, keep bins chained up away from the main house and out of sight. Criminals often use them as climbing aids or ways to transport stolen property.
- Thieves often look for subtle changes in the environment. Open gates, empty driveway, letters left in the mailbox are all invitations to a criminal. *Inside the property:*
- Keep all doors and windows locked even if you are in the house. If you leave a room, close and lock the doors and windows.
- If you have an alarm, use it! Most alarm systems can be 'zoned', which means parts of the house can be active at night time.
- Always remove the keys from locks to stop someone breaking a small pane of glass and entering using the key. Keep keys out of sight and in a safe place.
- Leave lights on in multiple rooms. Automatic timers can switch on lights and radios. Remember that in the winter it can get dark in the early afternoon.
- Make items traceable. Mark your property with your postcode using a UV pen or consider specialist liquid forensic coded solutions. Following the above measures will make you a less attractive target for

thieves. People who are security conscious are less likely to be burgled than those who are not. For more crime prevention advice visit:

Subject: UKRAINE - URGENT SUPPLIES APPEAL

I must thank those of you who have contributed so magnificently to my latest appeal for warm clothing and medical supplies. The items donated started their long journey to Ukraine recently.

The news today from the ground in Ukraine is that Ukraine is losing more than 600 soldiers' lives each day with many more seriously injured, including innocent civilians. Russian casualty figures are very much higher; we understand that now female, long-term gaol prisoners are being recruited to fight on the Russian front line.

Many Ukrainian hospitals, clinics etc. have been rendered unable to provide a service because of constant Russian bombardment. In the coming 3-4 weeks, Russia is expected to launch a very large attack on two or more fronts. This will increase dramatically the number of military and civilian dead and injured. Hence, the urgent appeal for medical supplies continues apace. Some serious operations are being carried out in insanitary conditions. The need for supplies grows daily.

If you, or any of your friends, family and contacts are able to contribute supplies -bandages, Tenna pads, sanitary products, disposable nappies and even soap and other cleansing products such as creams, please let me know and I will collect them from

you. Sadly, we cannot collect and despatch prescription only items. Also, there is a new and urgent appeal for medical aids such as walking sticks,

crutches, zimmer frames, neoprene joint supports and similar items. The numbers of injured Ukrainian soldiers and civilians continues to grow and an ambulance is being prepared to be driven to Ukraine to help rescue them: the walking wounded NEED support equipment.

Again, thank you for your responses, these are very much appreciated and WILL help to save lives. As always, I am very happy to collect everything. Thank you for your support.
