Introducing Graham Brack



We are pleased to announce that Graham Brack will be serving his curacy in the Grand Union Benefice after his ordination as Deacon in summer 2023. Graham was licensed as a Reader in Truro in October 1991, and was licensed by Bishop Donald for the Diocese of Peterborough in January 2019 after Gillian and Graham sold their pharmacies in Cornwall and relocated to Yardley Gobion. Gillian and Graham have been very active in the South Cleley Benefice, particularly during the vacancy after the previous Rector left. Gillian will continue to assist primarily in South Cleley.

Graham is rather traditional in outlook and is a member of the Prayer Book Society, the Rural Theology Association and the Ecclesiastical Law Society. He has been training with the Eastern Region Ministry Course and has served placements at All Saints, Northampton and St Andrew's Hospital, Northampton.

Gillian and Graham have two children. Andrew is a librarian working in the

USA, where he lives with his wife Rebecca and their daughter Miranda (aged 8), while Hannah is an NHS emergency planning manager who lives in Yardley Gobion with her husband Sam and their daughters Sophie (5) and Olivia (2).



Knight Report April 16, 2023

Our last Knight sale on 25 March was a lovely social event. Visitors who were unable to come to the February sale arrived and new visitors who had never visited us before came, which was really nice. Coffee flowed and cake flew off the table, as did some of the jewellery and 'desirable' objects. The atmosphere was warm and friendly and visitors stayed after they had made their purchases to chat with each other and us. We took the grand total of £363.10 towards the fund for the relocation of the Knight. I had previously sold some scrap gold that had come in with the jewellery and because gold prices are so high, this brought us another £150, bringing our total currently in the fund up to £13,732.53.

We are still waiting at this time for movement from the DAC to allow a faculty to be applied for from the Chancellor. Hope, however, is on the horizon as finally, after a wait of 5 months, the church architects have visited the proposed new site for the Knight's tomb chest in the chancel and a new set of plans has been sent to the meeting of the DAC which was held on Tuesday 18 April 2023. The DAC has already agreed that the Knight should be moved to the north side of the chancel and wood from the choir stall that currently resides there would be reused to make panelling along the wall at the back of the tomb chest, offering both protection and presentation.

We still have to find additional funds to pay for the new stone floor to go under the chest and this will cost in the region of £2,500, as we need to pay a mason to install the floor and aggregates and repurposed stone to complete it. We also have an additional bill from the church architects for $\pounds1,700$ to pay for a new set of plans. Hugh Harrison Conservation has already sent plans and images of the proposed tomb chest but the DAC has requested that the church architects draw additional plans. There are no changes in the design.

Let us hope that the next report will bring major movement and a new beginning for Sir William!

A Swarm of Bees

I was weeding my front garden recently when Graham Welch commented on the large number of flying insects that were around. Within seconds, the numbers dramatically increased and he realised that the insects were bees. I moved away from the area and within 15 minutes, noticed that a swarm had formed on our laurel bush – thousands of them! I looked on the internet and phoned a local beekeeper, Rachel Wilson from Stony Stratford, who drove up to Alderton almost immediately and trussed up in her bee suit.



She had a special box with her with some honeycomb in it which she placed near to the laurel bush; she then snipped the branch which the bees were on off and gently placed it into the box, hoping that the queen bee was amongst those that went into the box. She left the box in situ for 4 hours or so and then returned, by which time virtually all the bees had followed their queen into the box – the queen obviously was in there. Rachel had a smoker which she used to mask the pheromones in the laurel bush



so that the bees would go into the box. It was absolutely fascinating to watch the process.

Rachel tells us that there is a bee-related show in Stony Stratford on 24 September in York House and as well as being able to see some bees, there will be candles and other bee related items for sale. It will be an opportunity to see bees up close in a safe environment and to learn about bee keeping and how to look after them. Entry is free. Linda Dards




