Rector's Letter

Matthew 28:18-20: Jesus said, 'Let the little children come to me, and do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. Truly I tell you, whoever does not receive the kingdom of God as a little child will never enter it.'

On 20 July, we celebrated the feast of Saint Margaret of Antioch, the patron saint of Alderton church. She was born in 289 and died in 304; very little is known about her life. Her mother died soon after she was born, and she was nursed by a Christian woman in her early years. Her father was a pagan priest. When she converted to Christianity, her father disowned her. We are told that she was a beautiful girl who, around the age of 15, caught the eye of Governor Olybrius, who asked her to marry him, but in doing so, she would have to renounce her belief in Christ. When she refused to do this, she was thrown into prison, where she encountered a dragon (devil) that swallowed her alive while she was holding the cross of Christ in her hand; this irritated the dragon's throat, making him let go of her. Margaret still went through many trials but stuck very closely with her faith in Christ; no matter what was thrown at her, she never once doubted him; in the end, out of frustration, they murdered her at the age of 15.

In this country, it is doubtful that we would experience the opposition that confronted Saint Margaret; this is not the case with many Christians in other countries who are persecuted, imprisoned, and tortured because of their faith. We might receive unsavoury comments from our family or friends, or at most, we may be mocked occasionally. Maybe because of the society in which we live, we become complacent and take our faith-beliefs for granted.

I have come across people who describe themselves as spiritual; some seem to have a mental block when it comes to Christianity, with ideas they have from the past about the Church or its teachings. Once unpacked, these have nothing to do with the actual teachings of Jesus.

When I visit the two church schools within the benefice, sitting beside young children and listening to them is a pleasure as they talk about their faith and belief in Jesus. It is so simple, it is not complicated for them; they're not caught up in the creeds or politics of the Church or society, but just a relationship with Jesus. This is the same way Margaret would have experienced her Christian faith in a relationship with Jesus. When we become adults, we put barriers in our way that can make our faith and teachings of Jesus too difficult, so we stop trying, and our lives are poorer for it.

Last month, I mentioned that we are running a course in September for people who would like to come along and explore their spirituality by looking at the teachings of Jesus which are not wrapped up in any dogma but just His teaching in Mark's gospel. I would like to encourage you to consider joining us for eight weeks on Wednesday evenings. Light refreshments will be provided. Each session is just 90 minutes long, where you can explore who Jesus is to you.

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STOKE BRUERNE

The Stoke Bruerne Village Clock

The Stoke Bruerne village clock, which is housed in the church of St Mary the Virgin in Stoke Bruerne is the responsibility of the Parish Council (not to be confused with the Parochial Church Council). For quite some time now, the clock has not worked and the Parish Council has not been very happy with the company who has been looking after it since it was electrified in 1999/2000 under the auspices of the late Roy Sears.

Your Parish Council had budgeted for a new speed indicator device (SID) for Rookery Lane, which was kindly sponsored by SEGRO who own the new buildings at Junction 5 of the M1. The Parish Council decided to obtain a quote from Smith of Derby who are the 'gold standard' of church and village clocks and have a strong association with the village through Richard Cox and his family.

Richard came and looked at the clock in January, following which Smith of Derby provided a quotation which was almost identical to the cost of the SID which SEGRO had kindly sponsored so it was unanimously agreed to allocate that money to repairing the village clock in the church.

The planning process we had to go through to obtain a Church of England faculty to repair the clock has to be experienced to be believed - it's taken 6 months. The good news is that the old electrical works have now gone to Derby and the electricians are scheduled to alter the electrics to fit on 24 July. Shortly after that we expect Smith of Derby to commission the new clock.

Is that the end of it? No, there is more, and expensive work that we should consider but, in the meantime, we will wait for other work that needs be undertaken on the church and will work with the Parochial Church Council. Kathryn Dodington


Summer Fair

Update on the Knight

We are still waiting for the papers that allow us to ask the Chancellor for a faculty to complete the knight project in St. Margaret's Church. The DAC gave us permission to go to the final stages of this journey at a DAC meeting on 25 April. Adrian Ringrose, architect and DAC member, gave us this news the next day. The DAC secretary told us formally of this permission a month later and we are still waiting for the papers that we have to fill in to arrive. It is now almost the end of July. We are getting increasingly frustrated, as we desperately need to get on to the toilet and servery project.

We are still fundraising as the constant delays keep increasing the costs of everything. We have paid the architect for our second set of plans as required by the DAC. This means that we are back to the basic amount that we have saved to pay Hugh Harrison for the knight's tomb chest. We still have to find the funds to pay our mason to lay a new floor under the new tomb chest. Neill Taylor and Cuttle Mill have very kindly said that they will cover the cost of the York stone and aggregates needed for this job. Our fund currently sits at £12,988.

Our next knight sale will be in the church on 26 August with its usual offer of lovely edibles and beautiful items. We will also be part of the Art Festival with even more lovely things to offer. Thank you all for your support so far. We really are nearing the end of this journey but it is an agonizingly slow one. Please keep faith with us – we will get there! Linda and Margaret



St Margaret's Day Service, 20 July 2023

34 people attended the St. Margaret's Day service in St. Margaret's Church, Alderton on Thursday 20 July at 6.00 p m. Although St. Margaret was, in the medieval mind, the Patron Saint of childbirth, the theme of this service was based on our relationship with the living creatures with whom we share the planet and the 'health' this relationship gives us.

Cannon Richard Stainer took the service and David Wortley read from Genesis, the story of the Creation. This was followed by music and contributions from 5 brave villagers.

Although the Creation story says that God created everything for the benefit of human kind, the feeling that emerged from the deeply personal stories was one of mutual benefit and certainly one that we have to think about now in this time of climate change and global awareness.

The stories began with music in the form of the Saint-Saens vivid musical description of a cockerel and hens from his 'Carnival of the Animals'. Carol Weston who spoke about her chickens then followed this delightful piece of music. What emerged was a lovely humorous picture of a relationship between Carol, the protector and feeder, and several individual feathery characters who were

determined to live life and hide eggs in their own way. The relationship obviously offered a range of feelings on Carol's part from frustration, through laughter, and love, all accompanied by eggs!

Lulu followed, disadvantaged by husband Richard, farmer and hunter, who was going to speak about his relationship with the animals both in his care and those he hunted. However, he backed out at the last minute and went fishing. Lulu spoke about her relationship with the dogs that she inherited when she married Richard. They were his dogs and although she looked after them, she didn't really bond with them. However, after a close bereavement during the pandemic she chose to walk the local equivalent of the 500-mile Camino de Santiago Pilgrimage over a period of weeks, taking the dogs with her. This decision became a major turning point for her and now one of them, a fully-grown black Labrador, insists on sitting on her lap. Love!

Daryl followed with delightful stories of featherless chickens rescued by her and Bob when their two boys were young, leading to a menagerie of disadvantaged animals and the production of a very accomplished young vet and his brother who is keeping up the collecting tradition.

Jacqui and wonderful Havoc, her beautiful and incredibly loving Lurcher, followed. Havoc, who is very much a villager, checks on everyone and has an eternal smile on her lovely face; her only sin is to polish off the occasional pot of cat food that has been carelessly left out. Jacqui spoke very movingly about her close friendship with this wonderful dog who has been by her side through recent, very close bereavement, and is always there for her.

Lastly there were no words but music, offered by Sarah who, with Jo, has moved recently into The Round House. Sarah played Saint-Saens' 'The Swan' on her cello. This beautiful



piece of music transfixed everyone. A piece of artistry inspired by, in this case, a bird, took everyone to a place that sometimes words won't go. What a gift the relationship between us all has given.

The social event that followed, with bubbles and nibbles, as advertised, was electric. Lots of people stayed on after the service, and Sarah played again for us. Linda and I finally locked up the church at about 10.30 p m! A wonderful service, full of warmth, love and laughter. Half of the collection has been sent to the Milton Keynes branch of the RSPCA. Police information

Burglary Prevention Advice

Our aim is to prevent Northamptonshire residents falling prey to criminals. We are taking a more scientific approach to repeat victimisation. Due to the location of recent burglaries, we know that your home is at heightened risk of being burgled. An opportunistic type of criminal is enticed into a situation as a result of an insecurity or easy opportunity. If we simply remove that temptation and make it difficult, then it is estimated that a staggering 90% of crime would be prevented. We have compiled a short home security checklist to help guide you through your security arrangements. Working through this checklist will help you ascertain whether you have any security weaknesses. Please remember to call 101 if you see any suspicious activity or 999 if you see a crime in progress. Alternatively, if you have any information about crime or criminals in your area, you can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Outside the property:

• Make thieves feel exposed when they approach the front of your property by using low hedges or low fencing. Keep any gates shut when you're out.

• Use garden lighting to deter trespassers. If the property is well overlooked, choose lights which come on automatically at dusk and stay on all night until dawn. Low wattage bulbs can cost less than 1p per night in electricity.

• You can reinforce your boundary by using prickly plants. Use of natural plants is exempt from the Occupiers' Liability Act 1984 - because it is natural.

• Don't leave tools and ladders lying around for burglars to use. Remember to keep the shed as secure as possible. Thieves often search for tools nearby to break into properties.

• Where possible, keep bins chained up away from the main house and out of sight. Criminals often use them as climbing aids or ways to transport stolen property.

• Thieves often look for subtle changes in the environment. Open gates, empty driveway, letters left in the mailbox are all invitations to a criminal. Inside the property:

• Keep all doors and windows locked - even if you are in the house. If you leave a room, close and lock the doors and windows.

• If you have an alarm, use it! Most alarm systems can be 'zoned', which means parts of the house can be active at night time.



• Always remove the keys from locks to stop someone breaking a small pane of glass and entering using the key. Keep keys out of sight and in a safe place.

• Leave lights on in multiple rooms. Automatic timers can switch on lights and radios. Remember that in the winter it can get dark in the early afternoon.

• Make items traceable. Mark your property with your postcode using a UV pen or consider specialist liquid forensic coded solutions. Following the above measures will make you a less attractive target for thieves. People who are security conscious are

Silverstone Weekend and The Towcester and Roade Community Larders

At the beginning of July, 480,000 people, a sell-out crowd, descended on Silverstone Circuit for the F1 Amaco British Grand Prix. Inevitably, when catering for such large numbers, there will be food surplus. But rather than it go to waste, our volunteer teams

from Towcester and Roade Community Larders work closely with the sustainability and catering teams at the circuit to save as much as possible.

This year, just over 11.2 tonnes (this is approximately 11 transit vans FULL of food) was rescued and distributed by over 40 volunteers from the Larders. Several pop up sessions, open to the entire community, were held throughout the week and over 650 people attended.

With many people struggling at the moment it was great to get some fresh fruit, vegetables, eggs, bread and other delicious food that would have otherwise gone to waste, distributed.
