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Rector's letter - St Aidan of Lindisfarne, 590-651

Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying, 'Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?' And I said, 'Here am I; send me!' Isaiah 6:8

This verse is used at morning prayer for the feast of St Aidan (31 August), who lived between 590 and 651. Aidan was a young Celtic monk from the island of Iona, just off the west coast of Scotland. King Oswald, king of Northumbria, requested that missionaries be sent from Iona to preach the gospel in his kingdom. Oswald turned to the Celtic in the north rather than the Roman church in the south.

The first monk to be sent was Corman, who was hard on the people and returned unsuccessful, saying that the people who inhabited Northumbria were stubborn and unreachable. Aidan quickly volunteered to take the gospel to Northumbria when he heard this. This came at a great price; he had to leave his beloved island and his companions in Christ. Once in Northumbria, Aidan worked closely with Oswald, who interpreted for him. He chose the isle of Lindisfarne to build his monastery, which grew, then began to help found churches throughout the area. It also became well known as a centre for education, training many for the priesthood to help teach the Gospel of Christ. He became the first Bishop of Lindisfarne.

He is one of the most successful evangelists of these islands. The Celtic church was thriving and spread throughout Europe.

You might be asking why I wrote about Sanit Aiden; one reason is that he is an inspiration to us all. He lived at a time of political unrest and fear of invasion. Against all opposition, he brought hope for a better future by preaching a world of peace where all are equal and valued without exception. We live in a time not too dissimilar to Aiden.

He found that the best way to help others was to teach the teachings of a young rabbi that brought healing and focus to the people around him. These teachings brought solace to all who heard and understood him. Like our ancestors (Aiden), we, in the Grand Union Benefice, are carrying on the work that started hundreds of years ago in helping others to know and understand the life-changing teachings of Jesus.

Over the coming year, there will be opportunities for all to explore the teachings Aiden shared with the people of his time - starting on 6 September in Holy Cross Church, Milton Malsor.

We are thankful for the example of Aiden and the many others who followed in his footsteps in spreading the teaching of Jesus through the centuries; we have fine buildings in our communities because of them, it is now our turn to carry the responsibility for the life-changing teaching to be passed on to our children. (One of my favourite churches is in Bamburgh dedicated to Aiden.)

Discover Grafton's Amazing History on our 2024 Historical Walks - 1,000 Years in 100 Minutes

Our final walk of 2023 is already fully booked, so why not plan to spend a leisurely May afternoon next year in our beautiful and historic village? Our first historical walk of 2024 is scheduled for Saturday 11 May, starting at 2.30 p m. Hear the story of Grafton's colourful past from some of its most famous and infamous characters, and finish up with tea and cakes!

In the village hall, you'll meet characters from the early history of the village, all in authentic costume - the Norman Abbot of Grestain, several members of the Woodville family, and Richard III, anxious to restore his reputation. En route to the Church of St Mary the Virgin, Henry VIII and several of his queens, Cardinal Wolsey and Elizabeth I are just some of the eminent figures to be encountered.

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In the church, Lady Crane, the last tenant of Grafton House, recalls its destruction during the Civil War siege, and there are stories of the FitzRoy family, Dukes of Grafton, and of the Grafton portrait of Shakespeare. There's also a chance to see our impressive heritage centre, created with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund. Then, back to the hall to meet a couple of more recent residents and for refreshments.

Next year we're planning three historical walks, all on Saturday afternoons and starting at 2.30 p m. The dates are 11 May, 22 June and 21 September. The cost for adults, including refreshments, is £9.50 per head, under 16s £1.00, under 5s free, with all profits being shared between the funds for maintenance of the village hall and of the church.

Plant and Crop Swap



Sale for the Knight

The latest sale for the knight raised just under £400, which is an amazing result. People started arriving at about 9.30 a m and the cakes flew off the table – well, like hot cakes! We had a huge selection available and very few left by the end of the morning, and some of those have since been sold. Margaret sold a lot of jewellery and other treasures from her stall and the jams and pickles sold well too; there was a lovely atmosphere, with many people stopping to have a cup of coffee and a chat. We are always so grateful to those who support us, many from outside the village. We will be having a stall for the knight at the art festival on 2 and 3 September so do come and say hello.

Service for St Filbert and Harvest Festival

20 August is the Feast Day of St. Filbert or Philibert, as he is known in France. We know him in England because he shares his name with the hazel nut. It was the English who changed his name to Filbert as his Feast Day falls at the beginning of the Kentish hazelnut harvest. However, as the calendar has been changed over the centuries, this really no longer applies and the hazelnut harvest begins about 10 days later at the beginning of September.

This year we chose to hold our Harvest Festival on Saint Filbert's Feast Day as the date we had originally set, 26 September, became unworkable and there were no other dates in September or October that were available. Unfortunately, most of the village was away on holiday but friends and the few villagers who were at home came along, making the Harvest service and Harvest supper a really lovely event. As always, Cannon Richard had found beautiful readings and references to the wholeness of nature and the old favourite hymns were sung. The produce which had been donated was sold off to the congregation – thanks to Martyn for being the auctioneer – some proceeds from the event will be sent to a local charity. Supper followed the service and an evening meal consisting of a range of delicious hot and cold meat and vegetable dishes were offered, followed by some yummy desserts. Everyone sat in the afternoon sun (one shower fell between courses) and talked and laughed. It was a gentle, lovely Harvest supper.



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We were questioned about the date as the grain harvest had not been gathered in and as we have had so much rain, it looks as if that harvest will not be so safely gathered. Global warming is changing the traditional harvest and the increase in vegetarianism and other food-related questioning might require us to rethink 'harvest'. Hazel nuts provide a good source of secondary protein and there are other fruits and berries that we now collect that would not have been available to us before. Perhaps our early Harvest Festival was not so out of place as was first thought.

Saint Philibert lived between 608 and 684. He was abbot and monastic founder of Jumieges Abbey in Normandy and later, after a period of trouble, founded Noirmoutier on the Island of Her under the jurisdiction of the Bishop of Poitiers. Here he instigated land reclamation for agriculture, salt extraction, irrigation, communication routes and monastic buildings. He was not martyred; he died and his reliquary were moved to Tournus and remained there until it was broken into in 1998 and his skull and two bones were stolen. He obviously still has something to say.

Ride and Stride

A Pilates Class with a Difference

Have you been recommended to do Pilates but are tentative as you've had pain or you have a condition that needs a little more care? BACK at EASE Pilates classes in Hardingstone village hall may be just what you're looking for.

Instructed by an experienced osteopath, we are a little different to fitness-based Pilates classes because we teach Clinical Pilates. This means the traditional Pilates movements have been analysed and combined with the best current evidence in exercise rehabilitation medicine research of what's helpful and safe to help our participants to get stronger safely. All of the Pilates movements in our classes have levels of them and we can tailor the movements and exercises to each individual in the class, so you always have options on how to move for how you're feeling that day or what is appropriate to your previous injury, long standing medical condition, joint replacement or arthritis.

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Before being an osteopath, I was a professional dancer and fitness Pilates instructor prior to doing the Clinical Pilates training in 2010, and I set up these specialist BACK at EASE Pilates classes to provide a more clinically-informed option for people who have had pain in their body or have ongoing medical issues who would benefit from Pilates – but who also needed a little more supervision and support with someone who has clinical understanding of their issues.

Our BACK at EASE classes are all about giving options and adaptations to each individual so you can learn how to move well for your current situation and build from there safely and progressively. We also aim to empower our participants with knowledge about how to work their bodies best and keep any longstanding issues to a minimum - so we do lots of talking and education in the classes, to put the movements into context of how they can benefit day to day tasks so the classes help you learn about your body and how to help yourself. I'm also super proud of the supportive atmosphere in all of our Pilates classes from fellow participants, which I think comes from the commonality of sharing the class with people in a similar situation. There's no judgement about what levels people do (and no leotards and legwarmers required); it's a fabulous collective of people who need a little more support, want to learn about their body and get stronger, and who support one another.

Our classes are usually full, with waiting lists, but I'm pleased to say we've got a brand new class starting from September at 10.30 a m on a Wednesday morning in Hardingstone village hall so we currently have some spaces available. If you think this might be helpful for you, please get in touch to register a place as soon as possible. If you'd like to come along for a trial before signing up, we're always happy for participants to join us for a week, free of charge, to see for themselves what makes us so different - so if you think you'd like to give it a try, please email me at backateasepilates@gmail.com or leave me a message on 07880 750 258 and I'd love to help. We are planning an introductory class on 6 September - places will need to be booked for this as spaces are limited.

Police information

Burglary Prevention Advice

Our aim is to prevent Northamptonshire residents falling prey to criminals. We are taking a more scientific approach to repeat victimisation. Due to the location of recent burglaries, we know that your home is at heightened risk of being burgled. An opportunistic type of criminal is enticed into a situation as a result of an insecurity or easy opportunity. If we simply remove that temptation and make it difficult, then it is estimated that a staggering 90% of crime would be prevented. We have compiled a short home security checklist to help guide you through your security arrangements. Working through this checklist will help you ascertain whether you have any security weaknesses. Please remember to call 101 if you see any suspicious activity or 999 if you see a crime in progress. Alternatively, if you have any information about crime or criminals in your area, you can call Crimestoppers anonymously on 0800 555 111.

Outside the property:

- Make thieves feel exposed when they approach the front of your property by using low hedges or low fencing. Keep any gates shut when you're out.
- Use garden lighting to deter trespassers. If the property is well overlooked, choose lights which come on automatically at dusk and stay on all night until dawn. Low wattage bulbs can cost less than 1p per night in electricity.
- You can reinforce your boundary by using prickly plants. Use of natural plants is exempt from the Occupiers' Liability Act 1984 because it is natural.
- Don't leave tools and ladders lying around for burglars to use. Remember to keep the shed as secure as possible. Thieves often search for tools nearby to break into properties.
- Where possible, keep bins chained up away from the main house and out of sight. Criminals often use them as climbing aids or ways to transport stolen property.
- Thieves often look for subtle changes in the environment. Open gates, empty driveway, letters left in the mailbox are all invitations to a criminal. *Inside the property:*
- Keep all doors and windows locked even if you are in the house. If you leave a room, close and lock the doors and windows.
- If you have an alarm, use it! Most alarm systems can be 'zoned', which means parts of the house can be active at night time.
- Always remove the keys from locks to stop someone breaking a small pane of glass and entering using the key. Keep keys out of sight and in a safe place.
- Leave lights on in multiple rooms. Automatic timers can switch on lights and radios. Remember that in the winter it can get dark in the early afternoon.
- Make items traceable. Mark your property with your postcode using a UV pen or consider specialist liquid forensic coded solutions. Following the above measures will make you a less attractive target for thieves. People who are security conscious are less likely to be burgled than those who are not.
