A Victorian Whimsy

This article first appeared in GRASS in November 2018, but we thought it might interest some of the newer residents of Stoke Bruerne:

The late well-known local historian, Mr George Freeston of Blisworth, wrote a translation of what he

termed, "this Victorian whimsy" which can be found at the entrance to the Stoke Bruerne churchyard from Wentworth Way.

He wrote that the owner of Stoke Park, Squire Vernon, walked on Sundays to Stoke Bruerne Church along a well-maintained footpath. He continued, "at the entrance to the churchyard is still to be seen the gateway through which he passed. This gate is flanked by two stone pillars, on one of which the following description is to be seen."

ParsoN GavE (permission to erect)


WardeN DravE (carried the materials by horse and cart)



Looking Forward to Summer in Grafton - Grafton Regis: 1,000 Years in 100 Minutes

Our final historical walk of 2023 was fully booked, so this is a reminder to book early for next year! The date of the first walk is Saturday 11 May, starting at 2.30 p m. You'll hear the amazing story of Grafton's colourful past from some of its most famous and infamous characters, and finish up with tea and cakes.

We start in the village hall, meeting characters from the early history of the village, all in authentic costume - the Norman Abbot of Grestain, several notable members of the Woodville family, and Richard III, anxious to restore his reputation - did he kill the Princes in the Tower, sons of Elizabeth Woodville? Or was someone else responsible, or did they leave the Tower of London alive

En route to the Church of St Mary the Virgin, Henry VIII (the man who added 'Regis' to Grafton's name) and several of his queens, Cardinal Wolsey and Elizabeth I are just some of the eminent figures to be encountered.

In the church, Lady Crane, the final tenant of Grafton House, tells the dramatic story of the destruction of the house during the Civil War siege at Christmas 1643, and you will also learn of the exploits of the FitzRoy family, Dukes of Grafton, and about the mystery of the Grafton portrait of Shakespeare.

There's also a chance to see our impressive heritage centre, created with funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund. Then, back to the hall to meet a couple of more recent residents and for refreshments.



Next year we're planning three historical walks, all on Saturday afternoons and starting at 2.30 p m. The dates are 11 May, 22 June and 21 September. The cost for adults, including refreshments, is unchanged from 2023 despite inflation! It's £9.50 per head, under 16s £1.00, under 5s free, with all profits being shared as always between the funds for maintenance of the village hall and of the church.

Remembrance Day



Update on the Knight

As you know, we now have our faculty, which allows us to proceed with the building of the new tomb chest for our wooden effigy of Sir William de Combmartyn. The existing choir stall on the north wall of the chancel at St. Margaret's Church will be removed and stored as it is being reused as panelling behind the new chest. The old wood of the choir stall will still be dark but the chest will be light in colour for the time being as it is being made from new English oak. It will darken in years to come. Here is the design presentation drawn by Hugh Harrison's architect, Peter Furguson. This will give you some idea of the finished work.

Hugh Harrison's specialist carpenters are coming up to remove the choir stall before Christmas and the wood will be stored safely until it is needed. The masons, who are replacing the



existing wooden floor under the choir stall with repurposed cathedral grade stone kindly donated by Neill Taylor and Cuttle Mill Reclamation, will be doing so as soon as they are able to find a window in their current work schedule.

Cuttle Mill Reclamation have asked if they can produce an article about the project with special concentration on the stone floor that is being donated. We have agreed as their offer of the aggregates and repurposed stone is incredibly generous.

Thank you all for your support over the years. Every single donation has gone towards this final outcome. We are all excited to see the knight in his final resting place. It will still be some time before this happens but at some point next year, we will be in touch to announce a celebration!


