about 40 villagers with buck's fizz and served hot and cold platters for everyone to enjoy. There was a video display of how the hall has been updated over the last


three years. It was a lovely, friendly event celebrating the joy of Christmas.

Stop 3000 Trucks Campaign


Donation to Furtho Development Opposition Group/Stop 3000 Trucks

Representatives of FDOG came to the Annual General Meeting of the Grafton Regis Parish Meeting on 28 November. They described the proposal to build a series of huge warehouses close to the A508/A5 roundabout. If carried through, the enormous volume of additional heavy goods traffic will inevitably have a serious impact on Grafton and surrounding villages. The meeting was also able to see a model of the proposed development.

Following this presentation, it was unanimously decided at the Grafton Millennium Fund AGM held later in the evening that the sum of £2,000 should be donated from the fund to support the work of FDOG. It was also agreed that individuals should be encouraged to send objections. Further donations are also urgently needed. <u>Henny</u>

A long-standing police support volunteer has been recognised for her service by the High Sheriff of Northamptonshire. Henny Cameron from Alderton has been volunteering with Northamptonshire Police for more than 10 years. She was presented with her award by the High Sheriff, Milan Shah MBE, who each year makes a number of personal awards in the field of law and order, to recognise and celebrate the work of individuals who have made outstanding contributions to the communities in which they live or work.

Henny's volunteering career for the Force began in January 2012, following her retirement from a police staff role in the IT department. As a volunteer with the Northamptonshire Safer Roads Alliance, she contributes to improving road safety by helping to organise the successful Mature Driver Roadshows that aim to keep this vulnerable age group driving safely for longer. Henny has also been involved in a diverse range of community and schools' engagement events. In particular, she plays an integral role in the organisation of the annual County Schools' Challenge, a partnership project that has been running for 15 years across secondary schools in Northamptonshire, which helps thousands of pupils learn about important social issues while teaching them invaluable skills.

Prevention Manager Sara Postlethwaite praised Henny's contribution to community safety and her support for young people. She said: "Henny is the backbone of the County Schools Challenge. Thousands of children have benefitted from engaging in this programme which is a joint effort between the police and fires services, supported by funding from the Office of the Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner. Henny creates the packages for schools, liaises with key partners and co-ordinates all the significant programme events, trophies and fun activities for the children. In addition, she supports the learning and development of our officers

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by acting as a role player for training scenarios. Her abilities and willingness to support others are an inspiration worthy of high praise, and this recognition from the High Sheriff is extremely well deserved."

High Sheriff Milan Shah said: "As so often, the motivation to set up a schools' challenge was born of tragedy in the local community, but it did not take long for the initiative of a few schools in Wellingborough to scale to countywide participation, and it is that momentum that Henny is so expert at keeping going. In over a decade of dedicated service to our county, Henny's efforts have contributed to whole generations reaching adulthood with a better understanding of safety issues and social challenges. A most worthy recipient of the High Sheriff's award."

The Force's Citizens in Policing Manager, Ann-Marie Lawson, added: "We are very fortunate to have Henny give her time and expertise freely to our Citizens in Policing programme. She is a well-respected volunteer who inspires everyone she comes into contact with to be the best that they can be. Becoming a police support volunteer is an excellent way to become involved with and gain experience of different aspects of policing, whether you simply want to help your community or are interested in pursuing a career within the police service. By volunteering with us you could play a vital role in helping us deliver and improve the service

we provide to our communities and, like Henny, help us make Northamptonshire a safer place to live, work and play in.

Henny received her award at a presentation in the old Court Room in Sessions House, Northampton. She told us more about the work she gets involved in and why she enjoys volunteering so much. Henny said: "I love being a volunteer with Northamptonshire Police. On the County Schools Challenge, I am always amazed at the energy and enthusiasm the students, who range from 11 to 14 years old, put into doing the Challenge - whatever the theme is, they just get it and work with it. I am always blown away by the innovative ideas they come with. I am passionate about road safety, so really enjoy being an active part of the Northants Safer Roads Alliance. To help plan and organise an event, then to have a room of over 70 mature drivers learning about how to stay safe on the roads is really satisfying. I am lucky as I can pick what I want to do - and that's how I have got involved in role playing for our training department. I saw an advert on our intranet for role players which I thought looked interesting, and it is! It's great fun! I am

overwhelmed but very honoured to receive the High Sheriff's Award.

A Floor for the Knight

December, before Christmas, was very busy in St. Margaret's. First, Hugh Harrison's specialist carpenters came up to Alderton from Devon to remove the choir stall from the north side of the chancel in the church and take some of the wood back to Hugh's workshops on Exmoor to be altered into panelling to go behind the new tomb chest. Cameron and Dan, father and son, arrived mid-afternoon on 13 December, worked to carefully demolish the choir stall on the 14th and left with the wood to return to Devon at 8.30 a m on Friday 15th. They stayed in my house and I went on holiday to Towcester to stay with my daughter, Tabitha, and grandson, Oscar, for two nights. We had a lovely time and Cameron and Dan said that they were very comfortable and extremely well fed thanks to contributions from Linda and Maureen. I don't know how we are going to match this when they come up to fit the tomb chest in the summer.

The second phase happened almost immediately - removal of the wooden choir stall floor revealed earth, and the new chest has to rest on stone. The next job was to bring in the stonemasons; Mark and Don Cronin from Buckingham, again, father and son, responded almost immediately. I had thought we would have to wait for the floor to be put in until after Christmas and we would have to cordon off the area at the next service. However, I emailed Mark on Friday 15th and he responded and said that they would be in to do the job on Monday 18th and could I order the repurposed York stone, kindly donated by Neill Taylor and Watling Reclamation at Cuttle Mill, and they would be in to choose the pieces on Monday morning? Would I also get a ton of sharp sand and 6 bags of cement? Plus a length of plastic to cover the floor in church while they worked. I thought this would be a huge problem but everyone responded immediately and on Tuesday morning the sand and cement arrived, the stone having arrived the day before. My faith in the workforce of today was completely restored and our old 'can do' attitude is back! I have Mark and Dan's details should anybody need a mason at any time.

The York stone slabs are incredibly heavy and the stone very thick. The slabs were cut to size by Don at the Round House gate and were carried into church and laid by Mark. The cutting creates a lot of dust so the patch at the Round House gate looks a bit 'white' at the moment but it will disperse. The floor of the chancel, even though it looks level, is not, and the masons had a huge job trying to level it as much as they could. Hugh Harrison, when asked, said that they are quite used to this situation and they would adjust the tomb chest accordingly.

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We have been very lucky in our craftsmen and they have made a superb job of the floor and I am sure will do with the panelling. There are still jobs to do but these will be attended to in the New Year. In the meantime, it looks as if nothing has been done to the chancel - just the choir stall is missing! Happy New Year to you all. Margaret



Notes from a Local Farmer

This is a time to look back on last year and let you all know the highs and lows of the farming seasons.

We experienced a lot more rain from the spring through to December. The grass grew in great abundance compared to the previous year but with the rain, it was difficult to make good hay until early September. The wheat harvest was good but spring barley took a long while to ripen so was difficult to harvest in September because the days were shorter. Maize did well with good yields due the wet weather compared to the previous season when it was so dry. Sheep have had a mixed year as the dry autumn previous resulted in low conception rates so the number of lambs sold was lower than usual. This time around, rates are back to normal. You can see from my comments how reliant we still are on good weather; the threat of climate change must be given more consideration but it's difficult to see much change in the immediate future. So maybe it's best to enjoy life and not worry too much.

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Police Information

Data Breaches

One of your online accounts may have been involved in a data breach where your passwords and other personal details have been leaked. This information could then be used by fraudsters and cyber criminals to carry out cyber-attacks or to scam and exploit you and others.

A good way to help protect your personal data is by closing dormant or rarely used online accounts. Always ensure you use a strong separate password (see Cyber Safety Guide) for each online account and enable a second layer of protection using two-step verification if available. This also applies to old accounts that may no longer be secure or that can't easily be closed. See ncsc.gov.uk/guidance/data-breaches for further details and reporting information.

How can you find out if your data has been included in a Data Breach?

Use a data breach search tool such as haveibeenpwned to find if any known data breaches include online accounts you use or were set-up using your email address.

- Visit haveibeenpwned.com
- Enter your email address or phone number to search for any linked data breaches (do not enter passwords).
- Visit each website mentioned in any data breach results to close or secure your account.
- If you are concerned about identity theft as a result of a data breach or other data leak visit cifas.org.uk for relevant advice.

Data Protection

See **enforcementtracker.com** and **informationisbeautiful.net/search/data+breach** for an overview of recent breaches and DPA/GDPR related fines. Visit **ico.org.uk** for UK data protection legislation and details of the related complaints process.

Copycat Websites and Online Services

Copycat websites that appear to be legitimate government services and departments are regularly set-up by cyber criminals. They are designed to steal your personal data and payment details or charge extensive handling fees for tasks that are normally free or can otherwise be easily completed online using the actual relevant government website.

Cyber criminals often post fake links on social media or use sponsored ads and other techniques to get their sites to appear in your Google or other search results when looking for an official site covering: driving licences, passports, business grants, blue badges, etc.

Always use the gov.uk website portal to find the genuine HMG (UK) government service, department or information you need.



Other Phishing Sites

Similar techniques are used by cyber criminals to get you to visit fake but realistic logon pages or phishing sites to obtain your passwords, personal information and payment details. These may look identical to the genuine online store, social media site, payment service, customer support page or account logon you would expect to see.

Avoid clicking links received via email, text message or social media unless you have verified the source. Fake competitions, quizzes, surveys, discount vouchers and offers are also popular methods used by criminals to get you to click on a link to a phishing site.

- Enable your browser (safebrowsing.google.com) or security software web-safe (eg. Microsoft Edge SmartScreen) feature to help avoid known untrusted sites.
- A rudimentary but useful check using a domain/web address can be carried out on: check.getsafeonline.org
- Report suspicious websites so they can be checked and removed: ncsc.gov.uk/section/about-this-website/report-scam-website


