Rector's Letter

"I am the voice of one calling in the wilderness, 'Make straight the way for the Lord." St John 1v23

The voice calling in the wilderness is none other than the patron Saint of Blisworth, John. John is clearly asking us to prepare the way for our Lord to come into our lives. On 14 February, we step out into the wilderness of Lent, a significant part of the Christian year. It is a period when we try to lessen our intake by fasting and giving up things so that we can focus more clearly on God. At 7.00 p m, we begin our journey through this season with the liturgy of Ash Wednesday, and receive the ashes upon our forehead which are made from Palm crosses from last year. Lent is when we travel the forty days and forty nights with Our Lord in the wilderness, as we begin with preparation and self-examination to prepare ourselves to experience the resurrection and transformation in our lives.

In one of the corners of my garden there is a beautiful rambling rosebush; over the last couple of years, she has grown out of control and was strangling all other life in that part of the garden. I pruned back those dead parts and then untangled those branches which had reached out; she didn't go down without a fight, biting me on several occasions! But I persevered, cutting her right back, and by doing this, in the coming spring, I'm sure she will benefit and contribute to that part of the garden instead of causing damage.

During this season of Lent, we do the same; we prune back the bad habits. We set aside time for prayer and holy reading. For some, Lent can be a long time, so giving up something we enjoy for that period can be difficult. Still, if we can do it, it will make us stronger in being able to resist more considerable temptations that become thorns in our lives; if doing this for the whole six weeks is difficult, then make it a priority to be in Church for one hour every Sunday morning for the entire period of Lent, to meet with others and to meet with Our Lord as He has commanded us to do. It's very easy to get out of the habit of coming to Church, allowing thorns to grow into our lines and choke out our Christian faith.

Lent is a time when we prioritise our Christian faith and restore our relationship with our Lord. It is a time to prune what is holding us back so that we can become the beautiful rose that Christ has called us to be.


Parish Council Meeting

Harry Tuckey RIP, 10.7.29 – 12.1.24

We are saddened to share the news that Harry died at the beginning of this year at the great age of 94. Harry's health had been deteriorating for some time, and after a brief stay in Northampton hospital over the Christmas period, he was cared for at home in his final days by his family with the support from the amazing Hospice at Home team and Marie-Curie.

Harry was a well-known local figure and many people will remember him as the owner of the sports shop in Wolverton, as the chairman of the North Bucks football league or as lifetime president of the Tennis and Cricket club in Wolverton.

Harry moved to Grafton Regis in 2013 and until recently enjoyed chatting to people on his walks round the village and was a regular at the village lunches and other events. He had celebrated his diamond wedding anniversary with his wife Joan last year and had been well enough to join in the village Christmas light trail in December. He will be sadly missed.

1,000 Years in 100 Minutes, 2024

Grafton's historical walks will be returning in May, hopefully coinciding with warm summer weather!

There's a chance to meet the eccentric Norman Abbot of Grestain – the Abbey owned Grafton for 200 years after the Norman Conquest. Members of the Woodville family, including Elizabeth, who married Edward IV in Grafton in 1464, and Elizabeth of York, who married Henry VII in 1486, tell their stories. Richard III will also explain the disappearance of two of Elizabeth and Edward's sons, the uncrowned Edward V and his brother Richard, the Princes in the Tower.

Henry VIII, the man who put the Regis in Grafton Regis and upgraded Grafton House into a palace, will be addressing his subjects, along with Anne Boleyn, who spent time in the village when Henry was trying to persuade the Pope to annul his marriage to Katherine of Aragon, who was living at Greenwich. The final meeting between Henry and Cardinal Wolsey, the second most powerful man in England, also took place in Grafton, along with the Pope's representative, Cardinal Campeggio. Shortly afterwards, Henry broke away from Rome and the Church of

Lady Crane, the last tenant of the original Grafton House, describes the siege and destruction of the house in 1643. Is the Grafton portrait really the earliest likeness of William Shakespeare, and why are so many members of the FitzRoy family, Dukes of Grafton, commemorated in the church?

Before tea and cakes are served in the village hall, Isabella Sams tells her story. She was the daughter of a Victorian Rector of Grafton and was involved in the local revival of the lacemaking industry as well as painting watercolour scenes of Grafton in the 1870s and 1880s. And Ada Brafield, long-serving village schoolmistress, describes life in Grafton's school, which is now the village hall, 100 years ago.

The walks start at $2.30\ p$ m on the following Saturdays – $11\ May$, $22\ June$ and $21\ September$.

Tickets are already selling, so please book soon to avoid disappointment! We have resisted the pressures of inflation, so the cost is still £9.50 per head including refreshments for adults, £1.00 for under 16s, and under 5s free. All profits are divided between funds for the maintenance of the village hall and of the church.



Don't use your energy to worry, use your energy to believe.

The best teachers are those who show you where to look but don't tell you what to see.

Do you use WhatsApp?



It has been identified that criminals are now targeting churchgoers and faith or community groups who use WhatsApp, to hack into and take over their accounts.

This prevents the legitimate owner from using or accessing their account. Criminals then send messages that appear to be from the owner, containing scams, investment frauds and links to malicious websites or fake logon pages. Any personal information, photos, contacts, etc. obtained are then used to enable further criminal activity.

Criminals also impersonate the account owner to request onscreen authentication codes from others in the same WhatsApp group. If successful, this then allows the criminals to takeover these additional accounts too.

Never share onscreen or account access (OTP) codes with anybody, even if the person calling or messaging you appears to be genuine.

Turn on two step verification (2SV) in your WhatsApp and Email accounts (in security settings) to add an extra layer of protection.
