Rector's Letter

At the end of this month, 31 March, we celebrate the major Christian festival of the year—the resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ on Easter day. Easter can fall any time between 22 March and 25 April, depending on when the first Sunday falls after the first full moon after the spring equinox. It means that March, if not all of the month, is always during the season of Lent, which means this month is a time set aside to look deeper within us.



This year, we have been holding our Lent course on three different days of the week and times to give as many people as possible the opportunity to attend. It has been very encouraging to see that the numbers have increased from previous years.

When I sit and reflect on some of the characters in the bible who gathered around Jesus during Holy Week, we can see that they are no different to us, they have their faults and strengths. When we approach Good Friday, we can see that all but Our Lord's mother turned away through fear and returned to their old ways of life. This encourages us, as we also know that we are not perfect. If we are honest with ourselves, we know we have our faults but still Our Lord comes and asks each of us to be part of His body here in these communities.

On 25 February in Saint Margaret's Church, Alderton, we held our nearly almost mothering Sunday service for the second time. Seeing so many people from the village attend this remarkable service was encouraging. We talked about the uniqueness of creation and the uniqueness of every one of us. Each one of us needs to be part of God's body here on earth so that we can form societies where EVERYONE is welcome, treasured and seen as our equal because we are all valued individuals in the eyes of Our Lord, all the colours of the rainbow that make brighter and more dynamic healthier communities, where our young and mature in life can flourish.

We gather for the start of Holy Week on 24 March with a benefice service at St Mary the Virgin Grafton Regis at 10.00 a m to celebrate Palm Sunday and once again listen to dramatised Gospel reading; on Maundy Thursday, we celebrate the Last Supper at 7.00 p m in St John The Baptist, Blisworth, and then we move into Good Friday for the liturgy of the Cross in St Mary's Stoke Bruerne at 2.00 p m, then we wait in silence through Holy Saturday and meet to gather at dawn on Easter day at St Margaret's Alderton at 6.00 a m for the first celebration of Easter with a short service starting outside around a fire as the sun rises in the east before moving into the church; the service is followed by breakfast. There are the two further celebrations on Easter Sunday, one at Holy Cross Milton Malsor at 9.30 a m and the other at St John the Baptist Church, Blisworth at 11.00 a m.

Holy Week is the most sacred week of the Christian calendar. Our ancestors followed the same traditions that we follow today. Please come and journey with us through this one week in the year. It is central to our Christian faith, where we learn much about what Jesus was willing to do for us.

May I wish you a happy and blessed Easter. Richard




1,000 Years in 100 Minutes

Towcester Heartbeats

WOULD YOU KNOW WHAT TO DO IF YOU CAME ACROSS SOMEONE SUFFERING A HEART ATTACK? - Well at the latest meeting of the Rotary Club of Towcester, members were given a presentation on the application of CPR and the use of a defibrillator. However, prior to the main presentation, there was a preamble by Annie Simpson who is a founder of a local community support group called 'HEARTBEATS'. This is a support group for people who have been affected by heart related conditions and in many cases, the mental trauma that follows heart operations. Partners, parents and carers of cardiac patients are also made welcome, as they can also be impacted by the patients' health issues.

This was followed by a presentation by Wayne, a fully qualified paramedic, on the application of CPR and the use of a defibrillator. Wayne explained the myths surrounding CPR and the fear most people face when having to make those decisions that could mean the difference between life and death for the patient.



Everyone should learn the basics of CPR and the use of a defibrillator. They could be lifesavers.

From the Police

Residents in North and West Northamptonshire are being encouraged to apply early to vote by post for the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner Elections this spring. On Thursday, 2 May, voters across North and West Northamptonshire will go to the polls to elect the Northamptonshire Police, Fire and Crime Commissioner.

The Police Fire and Crime Commissioner (PFCC) is elected to oversee local policing and fire and rescue services, manage the police & fire and rescue budget, set council tax rates for policing, and ensure transparent communication about police activities in

the community. They will also make key appointments of the Chief Constable and the Chief Fire Officer for the Northamptonshire area. People are urged to apply for postal votes as early as possible ahead of the deadline of 5.00 p m on Wednesday, 17 April and those wishing to vote by proxy (when someone votes on your behalf) can also do this in advance of the deadline of 5.00 p m on Wednesday, 24 April. Anyone who is not yet registered to vote must do so by Tuesday, 16 April in order to take part in this spring's election. You can register to vote on the gov.uk website.

Notes from a Local Farmer

Well, here we are on 18 February and it's still raining. On the weekend of the 12th, we had the worst flood I have seen for a long while with over 120 acres under water We have the sheep on stubble turnips at the moment apart from the ewes having singles which graze on their own. The advantage on turnips is we do not have to feed expensive food until they come in to lamb. The first 400 are lambing at the moment, producing some very good-sized lambs. The weather is unusually warm for the time of year so although it's wet, we are able to turn lambs out quickly as the grass is beginning to grow. This week we moved the lawns for the first time this year.

Otherwise, on the arable side, corn prices continue to slide downwards while this year's crop is looking very waterlogged. Livestock prices are very good at the moment; fat cattle can be worth around £2,000 and lambs around £150. Pigs are also a better price than they have been. So, readers can see there are mixed blessings in agriculture but nothing stays the same for very long - a bit like life!
