Rector's Letter





War Memorial

As you will all probably know Thursday 6 June is the 80th anniversary of D-Day; a time when we remember those who gave their lives for the freedom we enjoy today. For Stoke Bruerne and Shutlanger residents, those who gave their lives in the two great wars are remembered on the war memorial in the churchyard of St Mary's Stoke Bruerne. This war memorial is in need of some tender love and care after years of exposure to the elements.

We wish to restore the war memorial and what better year than the 80th anniversary of D-Day? We have approached the Parish Councils of Stoke Bruerne and Shutlanger, together with the combined charities of the two villages (The Charity of Thomas Bosenhoe and The New Charity Estate) to help with the costs (around £4,400 before VAT). We were saddened to learn of the death of Dr Derek Bull; he was a lovely man and I am sure he will be very much missed. We hope to print a full obituary next month.




